Reflection

Matthew chapter 10 started with Jesus sending out the Twelve disciples on a mission. As he gave them his authority they became his apostles and were given power to heal diseases and illness. Their task was to proclaim that the kingdom of heaven has come near.

Their mission was firstly to the lost sheep of Israel. Jesus gave them clear instructions and warnings of what to expect. There was much work to be done and they would not always be popular. Yet the fact that the message of God's love spread eventually to the whole world shows that their obedience to Jesus bore much fruit.

After the Spirit came upon them at Pentecost the message went out from Jerusalem in ever-widening circles.

Today we have simply read the last three verses of chapter 10.

Whoever welcomes you welcomes me and anyone who welcomes me welcomes the one who sent me. These are encouraging words.

I began writing this reflection in the very peaceful surroundings of Christ Church open for private prayer on the feast day of the Birthday of St John the Baptist, that great prophet who was the doorway between the Old Testament and the New. He preached the message of repentance and the message of being ready in our hearts to welcome our Saviour.

John the Baptist's extended family were expecting that he would be called Zechariah after his father but Elizabeth and Zechariah were clear that he was to be John, the name given to him by the Angel. Zechariah had been on his own personal retreat, unable to speak for nine months so he would have mastered the art of listening to God speak to him.

Several people in the scriptures are given new names because of the work or mission entrusted to them:

Abram becomes Abraham, the receiver of the covenant with God and the father of many nations.

- Simon becomes Peter the Rock on which Jesus will build the church.
- Saul becomes Paul – the Apostle to the Gentiles.
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I don't suppose many of us may be called to listen, without speaking, for several months as Zechariah was, yet we all have the opportunity to carve out a space each day when we can

pray, read some scripture, and give our Lord the opportunity to fill us with his Spirit.

I remember one speaker when asked about our need of the Holy Spirit said that he felt like a sieve who leaked. He was sure that he needed God to refresh and renew him each day and for that reason he prayed daily for the Spirit to fill him.

Some words we would have heard today had we been celebrating the Eucharist in church:

*O God, whose beauty is beyond our imagining
and whose power we cannot comprehend:
show us your glory as far as we can grasp it,
and shield us from knowing more than we can bear
until we may look upon you without fear.
Amen.*
